Instead of deep plots or even full sentences, you're faced with a single word and two more that represent options. Select one and you will be served the result, which determines the next step. That may sound gimmicky - and it's up to a point - but there are nuances and atmosphere that can be found in the small set of stories provided. During the play, one left us in a heartbreaking loop that we were desperate to escape. Another offered a sweet and satisfying conclusion after a complicated ordeal. (Image Credit: Playrise Digital Ltd) Tabletop Racing: World Tour(\$5.99 / 4.79 / AU \$8.99)Table Top Racing: World Tour is a high-speed racer who has to guide tiny cars around circuits made of comparatively massive household objects. It's like the offspring of Micro Machines and Mario Kart. Racing is extremely competitive, and you find yourself seeding opponents crazy through cunning maneuvers and unsportsmanproof weapons, in a crazy race to the finish line. While there are opportunities to upgrade your vehicle to better compete on tougher tracks, World Tour is devoid of IAP. Instead, it's your skills that will see you take checkered flags, and end up with enough money to buy stylish new cars. With simple but responsive controls, this Android game is a breath of fresh air on a platform where arcade racing is often so much about the of his wallet as well as his skills on the track. (Image credit: Feral Interactive) GRID Autosport(\$9.99 / 9.99 / AU \$14.99)GRID Autosport is a broker, but also a challenge for Android players complaining that they never get premium titles, and that the freemium rate comes full of ads and IAP. This is a premium AAA success without full advertising, transferred intact to your phone (assuming you can run it - see the list on the game's Google Play page). Even on PCs and consoles, GRID Autosport was impressive in its release. Five years or so, it is no less surprising as a mobile title, as it burns around 100 tracks, fighting in a variety of cars. That is, keep in mind, a simulation. It won't be easy for you, or let you break through the walls at maximum speed and follow as if nothing has happened, but driving aids help you master what is definitely the best premium racing experience on Android. (Image credit: Pixelbite) Repulze(\$1.49/-1.59/AU\$2.39)Repulze exists in the future beyond racers driving cars too fast; instead, they are placed in experimental hovers that accommodate crazy speeds. The traditions of track design have also been abandoned, flat courses being replaced by roller coaster constructions that throw you around the way you shake your stomach. The game is divided into three phases. Start with the time trials that have put you through doors of specific colors, and end with facing AI opponents, from time to time - and unsportsmanproofly - blowing with weapons. There's a sci-fi story about synthetic men and corporations, but actually this one has to do with speed. At first, twitchy controls will find you breaking down repeatedly on the roads and wondering if someone should take away your hovercraft license. But master the tracks and controls alike, and Repulze becomes an exciting experience as you bomb towards the finish line. Rush Rally 3(\$3.99 / 3.99 / AU \$6.99)Rush Rally 3 brings console-style rally racing to Android. For quick explosions, you can delve deeper into single rally mode, with a co-driver screaming in your ear; or there's the rallycross grinding metal, facing computer cars apparently fueled by aggression. If you're on it in the long run, immerse yourself in a full career mode. None of those options would matter a jot if the races weren't at once. Fortunately, it's very good. The game looks at the part, with very clever images and views, whether it's the belt around a race track or burning through a forest. The controls also work well, providing a number of settings to suit a number of preferences (tilt; virtual buttons) and skill levels. All in all, that's enough for the game to get that coveted checkered flag. Horizon Chase (free + \$2.99 / 2.79 / AU \$4.09 IAP)If you're fed up with racing games that pay more attention to whether asphalt looks photorealistic rather than how much fun it should be to get away at crazy speeds, check out Horizon Chase. This tribute to arcade titles old school has to do with the joy of racing, rather than boring realism. The graphics are vibrant, the soundtrack is cheerful and cheesy, and racing constantly finds you fighting your way to the front of an aggressive package. If you remember Lotus Turbo Esprit Challenge and Top Gear fondly, don't miss this one. (Note that Horizon Chase gives you five tracks for free. To unlock the rest, there is only one IAP.) Need for Speed: Most Sought After (\$4.99 / 4.99 / AU \$7.99)Anyone waiting for the kind of free roaming runs of console versions of this title is going to be miffed, but Need for Speed: Most Wanted is however one of the best games of its kind on Android. Yes, the tracks are linear, with only the strange shortcut, but the real part of the races is excellent. I aishish you through the sordid streets of a gray, bleak city, trying to win events that will boost your ego and reputation alike. Win your coffers, allowing you to purchase new vehicles to participate in special events. The game looks beautiful on Android and has a high octane soundtrack to install you onwards. But above all, this is about controls - a slippery combination of sensitive tilt and effortless drift that makes everything feel closer to OutRun 2 than the typically suboptimate mobile racing rate. Riptide GP: Renegade(\$2.99 / 2.99 / AU\$3.99)Riptide's first two games were zoomed along undulating aqueous circuits surrounded by bright metal towers. Riptide GP: Renegade offers another slice of futuristic races dotted, but this time you find you immersed in the sordid belly of the sport. As with previous games, you're still driving a hydroplane, and racing involves not only going very, very fast, but also being a massive spectacle at every opportunity available. If you hit a ramp or wave that throws you into the air, you'd better throw your ride or make a handheld stand, in order to get turbo-boost when landing. Sensitive runners get nothing. Career mode finds you making cash, improving your journey and probably ignoring the details of the story a little tedious. Racing, however, is excellent - an exciting mix of old-school arcade thrills and modern mobile touchscreen intelligence. Mini Motor Racing (\$2.99 / 3.19 / AU \$4.49)Mini Motor Racing is a frantic top-down racer that finds small daring vehicles on claustrophobic circuits that spin and spin in a clear effort for you to drive repeatedly on the walls. Cars are handled more like remote control cars than the actual fare, which means racing is usually narrow, and are easily lost if you look away from the screen for a moment. There is some content here - many dozens of races set in a wide range of environments. You zoom through the ruins, and mock the slopes of the beach. AI is sometimes a little too aggressive, but with smart car upgrades, and using nitro increase usage when racing, you'll be taking more than the occasional checkered flag. Need for Speed: Hot Pursuit exists in a world where police seem to think it's perfectly fine to use your extremely expensive cars to ram criminals fleeing in submission. And when they're not doing that, they get stuck along the streets, running to each other to (presumably) decide who pays for the doughnuts of the day. It's a pretty simple racer - it's basically weaving its way through the landscape, crashing into other cars, and triggering the strange trap - but it's exciting, windy fun that echoes Runners like Chase H.Q. Y once you've filled yourself with being one of the nitro-happy bikes, you can play a race like the chase, getting caught up in the kind of criminal shenanigans that crush cops who totally won't be covered by your car manufacturer's warranty. Final Freeway 2R(\$0.99/79p/AU\$0.99)Final Freeway 2R is a retro racing game, quite brazenly inspired by Sega's classic OutRun. You get tied up in a red car, smashing a road where everyone is driving suspiciously in the same direction. Occasionally, you hit a fork, allowing you to select your route. Meanwhile, cheesy music plays outside your device's speakers. For old hands, you'll be in some kind of gaming paradise. And possibly, this game is better than the one that inspired it, feeling more fluid and nuanced. If you're used to a more realistic meal, give it an idea of Final Freeway 2R: you may find yourself converted by its windy attitude, colorful visual effects and need for truly crazy speed. Motorsport Manager Mobile 3(\$3.99 / 3.99 / AU\$6.49)Motorsport Manager Mobile 3 is a racing management game without boring bits. Instead of sitting in front of a glorified spreadsheet, the game is a balanced mix of accessibility and depth, allowing you to delve into the crudetique of equipment, sponsors, mechanics and even lively ones. When you're ready, you can watch surprisingly tense and exciting races from top to bottom. (This is surprising because you're largely seeing numbered discs zooming around circuits.) One-off races give you an idea of things, but real meat is starting from the bottom of the stack in race mode, with the ultimate goal of becoming a winner. Everything is streamlined, slippery and mobile friendly, and a big leap from the relatively simplistic original Motorsport Manager Mobile. Mobile.

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
